Emanuel Green (1832-1919) F. S. A, F. R. S. L. was a distinguished antiquarian and local historian of Somerset.

He was born in Holcombe, near Frome, but he resided in Albemarle Street, London, many years, and it was there that he got together his splendid library of Somerset books, pamphlets, etc.

He was a prolific writer, and from 1867 wrote some two dozen articles, published in the *Transactions Somerset Archaeological and Natural History Society*. He also wrote some papers published by the Bath Field Club, and edited a number of volumes published by the Somerset Record Society. He also wrote a number of single books.

In 1902, Green published his *Bibliotheca Somersetensis: a Catalogue of Books, Pamphlets, Single Sheets and Broadsides, in some way connected with the County of Somerset*. It comprised 3 substantial quarto volumes containing some sixteen hundred pages. The first volume was devoted to Bath books, and contained the titles of several hundred items. In the general introduction, Mr. Green gave an able survey of the literature of the county. This was followed by a review of local literature from that time onward. The other volumes covered the rest of the county and the work is concluded with a comprehensive Index.

Time, travel, trouble did not count, and he spent several thousand pounds on his collection, which he bequeathed to the Public Library at Bristol, for use in the reference department.

METHOD

The Bridgwater entries in the Index were copied from the page scans in the digitised version on the Internet Archive's website, and were the means for the articles to be traced in the bibliography, to form the entries here.

Green's indexing is generally conventional, but a few entries were not found at the page numbers cited, so may be misprints. In a few cases, no numbers were cited. More concerning is that a number of Bridgwater-linked entries were not included in the Bridgwater articles in the Index, These include Henry and Robert Anstice on p. 116 of Vol

Green's topic criteria can be hit and miss, For example the very first Bridgwater index entry is "Adventures" in Vol 2, p 525, which is a word appearing in the middle of the title of: *Zummerzetshire rhymes. A collection of poems in the dialect of West Somerset, being the personal adventures of Jan, Tommy Nutty, and others in Bridgwater and elsewhere.* (1884). The second edition is more expansive: *Zummerzet rhymes. Poems by Jan (O. P. Q. Philander Smiff, i.e., A. A. Dowty) and Tommy Nutty. Enlarged. 2nd edit.*, There is an index entry for Jan in Vol 3, p 353 where the same book is cited. There is no index entry for Zummerzet.

Likewise there are index entries for O. P. Q. Philander Smiff. This was the pseudonym of Bridgwater-born Aglen Artemas Dowty, (1846-1906) who was a Civil Servant in the Paymaster General's Office, but was also a prolific contributor to Victorian comic and political satirical magazines. PDFs of Volumes 1, 2 and 3 were downloaded from the Internet Archives site, and printed copies made for help in editing these pages.

There is much material about the Civil War and the Siege of Bridgwater (on which Green was an expert), the Duke of Monmouth and the Battle of Sedgemoor. Numerous relevant Acts of Parliament are recorded. There are blocks of references noted on topics like Roads, Canals and Railways. There are numerous sermons and poems noted, as well as the occasional murder. Much of the material is arranged in the order of authors names. But the material stops at around 1900, of course
